Choral Conducting

In this rare opportunity you will get to work one-on-one with James Jordan, one of the fore-most experts on choral conducting in the country. James Jordan will detail important aspects of the Conductor's Architecture that transform the sound of any choir. Principles of Breathing will be discussed. Hone your skills, learn valuable new techniques, and transform your choral conducting with this groundbreaking master teacher.

Vocal/Cantor

In a traditional master class style, Jeanne Cotter will draw on her years of leading vocal retreats, clinics and workshops to give invaluable help with vocal technique, cantor technique and vocal production idiomatic to varying styles of music. Though individuals sing in a master class setting, Jeanne will include all attendees in the presentation, translating how the techniques covered with each individual singer can be used by all of the participants as well as those cantor/choir members they work with back in their home communities.

(Re)forming the Singing Body: How Luther's Approach to Music Can Renew Catholic and Protestant Worship Today

Why did Martin Luther famously declare, "Next to the Word of God, music deserves the highest praise?" Luther was fascinated by music's ability to renew the human spirit and the worshiping assembly. In this opening event, we interweave song and narration to highlight four dimensions of renewal that Luther understood could be accomplished through music: communion with the ancestors, the rituals of Sunday liturgy, daily spirituality, and connections with the earth.

Bringing Liturgical Piano Accompaniments to Life

This breakout session is for pianists and keyboard players who want to learn how to create great accompaniments that effectively lead communal song, expand published accompaniments to better accommodate numerous verses/refrains, and to competently play the varied contemporary keyboard styles found in current liturgical music repertoire.

Ignite Your Rehearsals with Efficiency and Artistry

Simply singing through choral music numerous times does not necessarily improve accuracy or quality. Raise your expectations by adding intrigue, variety, efficiency, and skill building to your rehearsals. Learn to focus on different issues for each piece of music. In this session, you will be provided several compelling GIA anthems as examples of teaching procedures, which would create an intriguing experience for and boost the skills of your choir members.

Obstacles & Opportunities toward Full, Conscious, and Active Participation

Why is the "full, conscious, and active participation" of the people so illusive in churches across denominations? This workshop will explore a series of challenges—liturgical, pastoral, and cultural, which may inhibit rather than encourage the sung prayer of the liturgical assembly. The workshop will feature a musical "coda" with an opportunity to sing through fresh arrangements of traditional hymns!

Ecumenical Worship

Our personal faith journey must always be in harmony and solidarity with our common journey as companions and children of God. In this workshop Marty explores the need for all Christians to find and celebrate our commonality rather than focus on the things that divide us. Ensemble Techniques

Marty Haugen offers valuable wisdom for working with and providing effective instrumentation for your Liturgical Ensemble. Learn the latest information on current instrumental practice and technology. Whether you are a director, instrumentalist, or singer, you will gain practical help on fashioning the best possible sound for accompanying the assembly in their sung prayer. This workshop is a must for musicians who need a practical, real-world guide to working with ensembles in the church.

Choral Conducting Techniques

James Jordan will detail important aspects of the Conductor's Architecture that transform the sound of any choir. Principles of Breathing will be discussed.

Planning Congregational Repertoire

At the center of our ministry as musicians is a deep imperative to strengthen not just our choirs, but the voices of the People of God who gather each week for worship. This session will explore long-term strategies to help you build a repertoire that works for your assembly, strengthen existing repertoire, introduce new music effectively, and plan for large parish gatherings.

Living, Praying, and Believing Eucharistically

For many decades, we have expanded our understanding of the relationship between liturgy belief, and daily living. But in separating these categories out for reflection, we often create stark divisions between them that miss their porousness in the practice of everyday life. This workshop will explore the fluid relationship between liturgy, belief, and daily living through the mandate of Pope Francis, rooting us in a theology that sees all of life as sacred and pointing us toward what it means to live, pray, and believe eucharistically.

Compelling Organ Playing

The Conductor as Leader in Rehearsal: Techniques and Practices Applied to Women's Choruses

How do conductors live out servant leadership in their rehearsal techniques and practices? This session will apply the key ideas from the morning plenary to the vocal rehearsal techniques and overall leadership of the ensemble, with particular application to women's voices as the often-unrewarded leaders within the choral program. Members of the North Central College Women's Chorale will serve as the demonstration ensemble.

Bringing the Spirit and Music of Taizé to Your Community



Ecotheology

MARTY JOHNSON Director of Education and Resident Director at iTheatrics

Marty Johnson, the Director of Education and Resident Director at iTheatrics, first became involved in the world of musical theatre when was 10 years old and his 4-H club put on an astonishing rendition of *Peter Pan*. Recently named by Playbill as one of the top ten educators who are shaping Broadway, Marty oversees all of iTheatrics' educational programs including a partnership with the Turn Around Arts that led to Marty directing students for the first two White House Turnaround Arts Talent shows hosted by former First Lady Michelle Obama.

Marty holds a graduate degree in Theatre for Youth from the University of North Carolina-Greensboro and just finished nine years of service as a board member for TYA/USA, the leading organization for the advancement of Theatre for Young Audiences in the world. He is also the co-author of *The iTheatrics Method: The Quintessential Guide to Creating Quality Musical Theatre Programs* published by GIA Publications, Inc.



CINDY RIPLEY Senior Educational Consultant for iTheatrics

Cindy Ripley is currently the Senior Educational Consultant for iTheatrics, leading workshops with kids and teachers across the country, as well as being the "go to" guru for MTI's online Show Support for the Broadway Junior Collection. Cindy piloted the first Broadway Junior production of *Annie JR*., and developed the first Broadway Junior Director's Guide. She was proud to be selected for USA Today's All Star Teacher Team for 2005 and most recently has served as a teaching artist for the President's Committee on the Arts and Humanities. Cindy is co-author of The iTheatrics Method: The Quintessential Guide to Creating Quality Musical Theatre Programs published by GIA Publications, Inc., and finds the recipe comprising young people, teachers, parents, musical theatre, and enthusiasm priceless!

CLINICIAN BIOGRAPHIES



JAMES ABBINGTON
Conductor, Organist, and Professor of Church Music at the Candler School of
Theology at Emory University

James Abbington's research interests include music and worship in the Christian church, African American sacred folk music, organ, choral music, and ethnomusicology. Along with his roles at Candler, where he as taught since 2005, Abbington is the executive editor of the African American Church Music Series by GIA Publications (Chicago). In addition to writing and editing, he has produced numerous recordings under GIA.

One of the nation's most respected choir directors, musicians, and authors, Abbington is a popular speaker, performer, and conductor at universities, conferences, symposiums, and churches around the world. From 2000 to 2010, Abbington served as codirector of music for the Hampton University Ministers' and Musicians' Conference, and as the national director of music for both the Progressive National Baptist Convention and the NAACP. In 2010, Hampton's Choir Directors and Organists Guild honored Abbington by naming their Church Music Academy after him, and in 2015, he became the second African American to be named a Fellow of the Hymn Society in the United States and Canada.



TONY ALONSO Liturgical Composer

Tony Alonso is one of the most prominent voices in contemporary liturgical music. His music reflects an understanding of the multicultural needs of the contemporary church as well as a commitment to strong ritual music. In addition to several published collections of liturgical music, Tony's music appears in compilations and hymnals throughout the world. Tony has shared his musical gifts as well as his love and knowledge of liturgy at conferences and events across North America and Europe. He is also the published author of several books and articles related to liturgy and liturgical music.

Tony holds a bachelor of music degree in choral conducting from Northwestern University and a master of arts degree in theology from Loyola Marymount University. An emerging theologian, Tony is currently pursuing a PhD in the Graduate Division of Religion at Emory University in Atlanta, Georgia, where he is focusing on liturgical and ritual studies.



DAVID ANDERSON Editor-at-Large, GIA & Director of Music, Ascension Catholic Church (Oak Park, IL)

David Anderson serves as director of music and organist at Ascension Parish in Oak Park, Illinois. David's outreach of music in the parish embraces a broad variety of ages and levels of musical ability. His formal education includes theological studies at Catholic Theological Union and Loyola University of Chicago, a master of church music degree from Concordia University and advanced choral studies at Westminster Choir College. David is a well-known speaker at many national conferences, is frequently asked to prepare the liturgy and music for various conferences and for retreats, has consulted and authored materials for Liturgy Training Publications (including *Handbook of Church Music for Weddings*), and served as Senior Editor and VP of Sacred Music at GIA. He also served on the hymnal committee for GIA's *Gather—Third Edition* as well as *RitualSong, Second Edition* and is an editor for *Singing Our Faith, Second Edition*, GIA's childrens hymnal. For over 18 years on the first Friday of each month, David has prepared and coordinated a Taizé prayer at Ascension Parish that brings together hundreds of people from many Christian traditions. This monthly gathering serves as a model for ministry, hospitality, and outreach.



DIANNE BERGANT Catholic Theological Union (Chicago)

Dianne Bergant, CSA, is the Carroll Stuhlmueller, CP, Distinguished Professor Emerita of Old Testament Studies at Catholic Theological Union in Chicago. She holds a B.S. in Elementary Education from Marian College, Fond du Lac, Wisconsin; an MA and PhD in Biblical Languages and Literature from St. Louis University. Her most recent publication is *A New Heaven, A New Earth*, a study of various biblical passages from the perspective of integrity of creation, published by Orbis Press.

Dianne Bergant was President of the Catholic Biblical Association of America (2000-2001) and has been an active member of the Chicago Catholic/Jewish Scholars Dialogue for the past thirty years. For more than twenty years, she was the Old Testament book reviewer of *The Bible Today*. Bergant was a member of the editorial board of that magazine for twenty-five years, five of those years she served as the magazine's general editor. From 2002 through 2005, Bergant wrote the weekly column "The Word" for *America* magazine. She is currently working in the areas of biblical interpretation and biblical theology, particularly issues of peace, ecology, and feminism.



MARILYN BIERY Composer & Director of Music, Fort Street Presbyterian Church (Detroit)

Marilyn Biery, AAGO, ASCAPlus award winner, was a 1982 finalist in the National Open Competition in Organ Playing, sponsored by the American Guild of Organists. Marilyn has served as director of music Ministries at the First Church of Christ in Hartford, Connecticut, associate director of music at the Cathedral of Saint Paul in Saint Paul, Minnesota, and most recently minister of music at Metropolitan United Methodist Church, Detroit, Michigan.

Marilyn holds the doctor of musical arts degree in organ performance from the University of Minnesota. Marilyn is a frequent collaborator with a number of American composers, including Libby Larsen, David Evan Thomas, Stephen Paulus, Pamela Decker, and James Hopkins. A series of her articles on American organ music was printed in the *American Organist* from July 2000 to June 2003; other articles have been published in *The Diapason*, on composer Harold Stover, organ professor Grigg Fountain, and the late Roy Johnson, former organ professor at the University of Arizona.



JENNIFER KERR BUDZIAK Conductor, composer, and author, GIA Publications and Loyola University (Chicago)

Jennifer Kerr Budziak is a Chicago area liturgical musician, author, conductor, and cantor and is a widely published and recorded composer and arranger of liturgical music.

During her years as director for Liturgical Music at the Office for Divine Worship, Jennifer served as conductor and cantor at many Chicago-area liturgical events and choral festivals. Jennifer has been involved in a number of Chicago area ensembles, including the Chicago Symphony Chorus and the Cathedral Singers. She has served on the choral faculty at St. Xavier University, North Central College, and Concordia University of Chicago and currently conducts the Women's Chorus at Loyola University. She authored Sight-Sing a New Song, a textbook on sight-singing and music notation for beginners and Sowing Seeds, Bearing Fruit: A Five Year Process for Growing a Singing Congregation, released in July of 2012, and is a frequent writer for Liturgy Training Publications on topics of music and liturgy.

She serves on the national council of the National Association of Pastoral Musicians and is a frequent presenter at the organization's regional and national conferences. Jennifer is currently director of youth music at Old St. Patrick's Church in Chicago.

Jennifer holds a doctorate in choral conducting from Northwestern University, a master's degree in choral conducting from Indiana University and a master's degree in theology from the Catholic Theological Union in Chicago. Her areas of research involve liminal studies in postmodern music and the application of qualitative research techniques to choral rehearsal and other community music settings.



JEANNE COTTER Liturgical Composer and Speaker

Jeanne Cotter is a commanding female presence in the American Catholic church. She is a liturgical composer, author, performer, parish mission director, master voice and piano teacher, inspirational speaker, and retreat leader. For over two decades she has inspired and taught audiences throughout the United States and abroad.

Jeanne holds a bachelor of arts degree in music (piano and vocal performance) and theology from the University of St. Thomas, St. Paul, Minnesota. She's completed advanced studies in song writing, contemporary vocal pedagogy, and music business from the Grove School of Music in Los Angeles, California, and holds a master of arts degree in psychology and spirituality from Lesley University, Cambridge, Massachusetts. She is currently artist in residence at St. Thomas the Apostle Church in Naperville, Illinois.

Drawing on her Irish heritage, Jeanne understands the power of storytelling to connect diverse audiences to our shared human story. Her own experience of growing up in a large, multiracial, multinational farm family from southern Minnesota informs the values from which she writes and speaks, deeply rooted in the gospel teachings of Jesus.

Jeanne Cotter has numerous recordings, music collections, and books published by GIA Publications, Inc., as well as Mythic Rain, LLC.



RICHARD FRAGOMENI Professor of Liturgy and Preaching at Catholic Theological Union (Chicago)

Richard Fragomeni has been a member of the CTU faculty since 1990. His teaching involves him in Roman Catholic theology, interpretation theory, and poetry. His current work is in the field of word and sacrament: the intersection of symbolic activity and language as it creates insights into the Christian proclamation of grace. Central to this work is a fascination with the power of liturgy and preaching in the transformation of the human heart.

Richard is an adjunct faculty member in the Department of Religious Studies at DePaul University. He also serves as the rector of the Shrine of Our Lady of Pompeii, an Italian-American spiritual center in Chicago's historic Little Italy. In addition to his teaching duties he is a preacher of parish missions and gives presentations nationally and internationally on liturgical, sacramental, and catechetical topics.




MARTY HAUGEN Liturgical Composer

Marty Haugen is a liturgical composer, workshop presenter, performing and recording artist, and author from Eagan, Minnesota.

For the past 30 years, Marty has presented workshops and concerts across North and Central America, Europe, Asia, and the Pacific Rim. He has over 40 recordings and more than 400 separate printed editions available through GIA Publications. A number of his published songs, including "Shepherd Me, O God," "Gather Us In," and "All Are Welcome," are well-known to many religious denominations. *Mass of Creation*, and several liturgical settings for Lutheran congregations, including *Holden Evening Prayer*, *Unfailing Light* (with Pastor Susan Briehl) and *Now the Feast and Celebration*, as well as a communion setting for the new *Evangelical Worship Book* (ELW-Augsburg Fortress).

Marty has served as an editor or consultant to a number of GIA hymnals and has been a contributor to hymnals or supplements for many denominational groups, including the ELCA and ELCIC (Evangelical Lutheran Church of America and Canada), the United Methodist Church, the Presbyterian Church (USA), the Mennonite Brethren, the United Church of Christ, the United Church of Canada, the Anglican Church of Canada, the Church of England, the Church of Scotland, the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints and Roman Catholic groups in Great Britain, Canada, Ireland, and Australia.



JAMES JORDAN Author and Senior Conductor at Westminster Choir College

Grammy-nominated conductor James Jordan is recognized and praised around the musical world as one of America's preeminent conductors, writers, and innovators in choral music. He was described as a "visionary" by *The Choral Journal*, which cited his book *Evoking Sound* as a "must read." The most published musician-author in the world, his 35 books form the canon for teaching of conductors and choirs world wide. At Westminster Choir College he is professor and senior conductor, and conducts Westminster Schola Cantorum and the internationally acclaimed Westminster Williamson Voices.

Dr. Jordan has studied with the legendary conductors and scholars of the past 40 years, including Elaine Brown, Wilhelm Ehmann, Frauke Haasemann, Volker Hempfling and the renowned music psychologist Edwin Gordon. His career as a conductor began as a finalist in the Leopold Stokowski Conducting Competition with The Philadelphia Orchestra under Eugene Ormandy.

This year, Dr. Jordan will make his Carnegie Hall debut conducting the *Stabat Mater* of Paul Mealor in addition to premiering Mealor's Symphony No. 1 at St. Machar's Cathedral in Aberdeen, Scotland. Dr. Jordan has been honored as a distinguished alumnus at both Susquehanna University and Temple University. He was awarded the distinguished Doctor of Music by the University of Aberdeen in Scotland in 2014 to honor his artistry and contributions to choral music throughout the world. The university, established in 1485, has awarded degrees throughout its history to only two Americans: Dr. Jordan and Morten Lauridsen. He also shares this honor with Gustav Holst, Benjamin Britten, and Dame Joan Sutherland.



DONALD NALLY Conductor of The Crossing & Director & John W. Beattie Chair of Music and Director of Choral Organizations at Northwestern University

Donald Nally is responsible for imagining, programming, commissioning, and conducting at The Crossing. He is also the director of choral organizations at Northwestern University, where he holds the John W. Beattie Chair of Music. Donald has served as chorus master at the Lyric Opera of Chicago, Welsh National Opera, Opera Philadelphia, and for many seasons at the Spoleto Festival in Italy. He has also served as music director of Cincinnati's Vocal Arts Ensemble, chorus master at the Chicago Bach Project, and guest conductor throughout Europe and the United States, most notably with the Grant Park Symphony Chorus, the Philharmonia Chorus (London), the Santa Fe Desert Chorale, and the Latvian State Choir (Riga).

Donald, with The Crossing, is the American Composers Forum 2017 Champion of New Music; he received the 2017 Michael Korn Founders Award from Chorus America. He is the only conductor to have two ensembles receive the Margaret Hillis Award for Excellence in Choral Music: in 2002 with the Choral Arts Society of Philadelphia and in 2015 with The Crossing. Collaborations have included the Los Angeles Philharmonic, the Philadelphia Museum of Art, the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, Lincoln Center, Mostly Mozart, the Cleveland Museum of Art, Carnegie Hall, National Sawdust, the Barnes Foundation, Boston's Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum, the International Contemporary Ensemble (ICE), the American Composers Orchestra, and The Big Sky Conservatory in Montana where The Crossing holds an annual residency. In the 2017–18 season he will collaborate as guest director with Lisson Gallery (London), the Cathedral Choral Society (Washington, D.C.), Haymarket Opera (Chicago), David Lang's Mile Long Opera (on the High Line in New York City), and is visiting resident artist at the Park Avenue Armory.









MICHAEL KEMP Choral Clinician

Michael Kemp is an internationally respected choral clinician, conducting more than 300 workshops and festivals over 35 years. He is conductor of the choruses and orchestras of Germantown Academy in Ft. Washington, Pennsylvania, and is a member of the legendary Kemp family of choral musicians. In addition to his conducting responsibilities, he teaches Advanced Placement Music Theory. He was recently awarded the Barness Chair for Distinguished Teaching in the Fine and Performing Arts. He is a Fellow of Melodious Accord and was awarded inclusion in the Marquis Who's Who in America. Educated at Oklahoma University, Westminster Choir College, and the Royal Conservatory of Music in The Hague, Holland, Michael was trained equally in the areas of voice performance, viola performance, and conducting. Michael has been an internationally respected clinician for 35 years, conducting and lecturing in some 300 workshops and festivals in 42 states and 5 Canadian provinces. He has conducted over 300 masterworks of the standard choral and orchestral repertoire. He is a published composer with Augsburg Publishing and the Choristers Guild.

MICHAEL SILHAVY Senior Editor at GIA Publications, Inc.

A native of Chicago, senior editor Michael Silhavy recently returned to the Chicagoland area and GIA after spending twenty years working in Minnesota. From 1985 to 1990 he was an editorial assistant at GIA while also working at Saint Barbara Parish in Brookfield, Illinois. For three years he served as director of music for the cathedral and diocese of Duluth. He then became associate director of the worship office of the Archdiocese of Saint Paul and Minneapolis; in that capacity he served as diocesan director of music, director of the diocesan choir and codirector of the archdiocesan pilgrimage choir. During his time in the Twin Cities, he also served as music director at St. William Church in Fridley, MN. In 1999, he began work with the noted composer Richard Proulx, creating an annotated bibliography of all his work; the resulting Richard Proulx Collection is housed at Saint John's University in Collegeville, Minnesota.

He received his training and degrees at De Paul University (music education), Loyola University (theology), and Saint John's University (liturgical studies). Currently, he serves as music director at St. Mary Church in Riverside, Illinois. Like many of the GIA editors, he values the weekly experience of making music with a choir and congregation.

BENJAMIN STEWART Gordon A. Braatz Associate Professor of Worship and Dean of Augustana Chapel

Benjamin M. Stewart is the Gordon A. Braatz Associate Professor of Worship and Dean of Augustana Chapel at the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago, where he has taught since 2009.

A frequent conference lecturer and ordained Lutheran pastor, Ben previously served as pastor to a small, Appalachian community in Ohio, and as village pastor to Holden Village retreat center in the Glacier Peak Wilderness of Washington.

He is a member of the North American Academy of Liturgy and serves as convener of its Liturgy and Ecology Seminar.

PHILIP ROBERTS Music Editor and Editor of Handbell Music

Philip L. Roberts is music editor and editor of handbell music for GIA Publications, Inc. He joined the editorial department in 1996. Phil edits the Resounding Faith Series: Handbell Music for the Church and serves as GIA's handbell clinician. He is a member of the board of directors for Handbell Musicians of America and a member of the Handbell Industry Council.

He is an experienced handbell and choral conductor and has worked in church music ministry for over 30 years. Phil holds a BA in music, majoring in voice and minoring in theology, from Elmhurst College, in Elmhurst, Illinois.



ERIC WHITACRE Composer and Choral Conductor

Grammy-winning composer and conductor Eric Whitacre is one of the most popular musicians of our time. His concert music has been performed throughout the world by millions of amateur and professional musicians alike, while his groundbreaking Virtual Choirs have united singers from over 110 different countries. A graduate of the prestigious Juilliard School of Music, Eric was recently appointed artist in residence with the Los Angeles Master Chorale having completed a five-year term as composer in residence at Sidney Sussex College, Cambridge University, United Kingdom.

As conductor of the Eric Whitacre Singers he has released several chart-topping albums including 2011's bestselling *Light and Gold*. A sought-after guest conductor, Eric has conducted choral and instrumental concerts around the globe, including sold-out concerts with the London Symphony Orchestra, Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, and the Minnesota Orchestra. In addition to several collaborations with legendary Hollywood composer Hans Zimmer, he has worked with British pop icons Laura Mvula, Imogen Heap, and Annie Lennox

A charismatic speaker, Eric has given keynote addresses for many Fortune 500 companies and global institutions including Apple, Google, the World Economic Forum in Davos, the United Nations Speaker's Programme, and two main stage TED talks.



RAMONA WIS Professor of Music and Director of Choral Activities at North Central College (Naperville, IL)

Dr. Ramona Wis is the Mimi Rolland Endowed Professor in the Fine Arts, professor of music, and director of choral activities at North Central College in Naperville, Illinois. She conducts the Concert Choir, Chamber Singers, and Women's Chorale and teaches courses in conducting, music methods, and servant leadership.

Dr. Wis holds degrees from the University of Illinois, Northern Illinois University, and a PhD from Northwestern University. An active festival conductor, clinician, writer, and public speaker, Dr. Wis has presented workshops across the country and in Canada, including presentations for the British Columbia Music Educators Association, the International Conference of the Greenleaf Center for Servant-Leadership, Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic, GALA Choruses, the Tennessee Arts Academy, the Illinois and Ohio Music Educators Associations, and in 2016, was the keynote speaker and session presenter for the ACDA North Central Division conference.


Dr. Wis's book, *The Conductor as Leader: Principles of Leadership Applied to Life on the Podium* has quickly become a leadership classic among conductors and music teachers as well as those interested in leadership outside the music profession. She has written for *The Choral Journal, Music Educators Journal, Teaching Music*, and the *China Europe International Business School Review*, and is a contributing author to *Toward a Description of Musical Experience* and *The Musical Experience: Rethinking Music Teaching and Learning*, written by doctoral faculty and fellows of Northwestern University.

Dr. Wis has served as president of the American Choral Directors Association in Illinois and on both ACDA and ILMEA executive boards. She has sung under Robert Shaw, James Levine, and Margaret Hillis, and has conducted and performed in professional, theatrical, community, and academic settings for more than 35 years. Dr. Wis also holds the 200-hour yoga teacher certification (CYT/RYT) with additional work in biomechanics and anatomy, continuing her study of the body-mind connection in choral music and conducting.




LUTHERAN SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY AT CHICAGO FIRST FLOOR


